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A Message from Deirdre O'Keeffe, Acting CEO CUHG



Welcome to the Winter 2024 edition of the OneTeam newsletter, where we share updates on the progress and achievements across the Cork University Hospitals Group.

As we reflect on the past year, I am immensely proud of the collective efforts of our entire team. Your unwavering commitment to excellence in patient care and service delivery continues to make a remarkable impact, and I am truly grateful for all that we have

accomplished together. This newsletter is just a small sample of the incredible work happening day in and day out, right across CUH Group. It highlights the dedication of our clinical teams, advancements in research, and our ongoing efforts to support staff wellbeing. As winter approaches, I encourage all staff to remain vigilant with hygiene practices and to take up the flu and COVID-19 vaccinations to safeguard both our patients and ourselves.

As demonstrated with the opening of the new Helipad last September, we are striving to improve the service we deliver for our patients, and our priorities for 2025 include working closely with our colleagues in HSE South West to prepare CUH for the planned expansions under the Government's Acute Hospital Inpatient Bed Capacity Expansion Plan. We are also focused on further implementing the National Trauma Strategy as we continue to develop CUH as a Major Trauma Centre. The proposed surgical hub will be another exciting step forward in enhancing our service capabilities.

The UVC Centre represents a significant Regional South West initiative aimed at ensuring patients receive the appropriate care, in the right location, and at the right time. This innovative service is now accessible to GPs and NAS staff for clinically suitable cases. Since its launch on November 4th, the service has successfully managed over 600 referrals. This achievement highlights the exceptional collaborative efforts across the region, showcasing the true potential of integrated healthcare delivery.

Additionally, the development of an 18 bedded Medical Admissions Unit, adjacent to the Emergency Department will further enhance our capacity to provide timely care during the winter months. I also want to acknowledge a successful first year of the Pathfinder service, launched in collaboration with the National Ambulance Service. Since its launch in March 2023, the service has responded to over 1,000 low-acuity 999 calls from older adults in Cork, providing a tailored and effective response to support our community.

We are incredibly proud of the ongoing development of our Cancer Centre; I look forward to the coming years where we will further enhance the service for both our patients and staff. The dedication shown by everyone involved is truly inspiring, and we are committed to ensuring that our Cancer Centre continues to develop as a place of excellence in care, research, and support.

Last June, we successfully completed the amalgamation of the Mercy University Hospital Paediatric Unit with our own Paediatric Unit. This was no small task, and it reflects the extraordinary efforts of staff from both hospitals in ensuring a seamless transition and improved care for our young patients. We are also honoured to announce that the CUH and UCC Paediatric Allergy Research group has been accredited as a Centre of Excellence by the World Allergy Organisation. This is the first of its kind in Ireland and is a reflection of our commitment to excellence in clinical care, education, and research in Allergy and Immunology.





In another significant achievement, CUH has reached an important milestone in supporting internationally educated nurses (IENs). Through the dedicated work of our Assistant Director of Nursing for IENs, alongside the entire nursing leadership team, we have successfully supported the integration of our international nurses, ensuring they meet the standards required for registration with the Nursing and Midwifery Board of Ireland (NMBI). Our collective commitment to staff wellbeing continues to grow, and a real example of this is with the CUH Physiotherapy Department establishing a new wellbeing committee. Their initiatives, such as the mental health awareness board and team-building activities, are fostering a positive and supportive work environment for their team.

On a personal level, since stepping into the role of acting CEO in September, I have been deeply moved by the support and dedication shown by everyone across the hospital. Having already been part of the CUH team, this role has given me a fresh perspective, and I am incredibly grateful for your continued efforts and the warm welcome I have received. Your hard work and commitment to our shared goals have been truly inspiring, and I am excited to continue working together as we move forward.

As we approach the Christmas season, I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to each and every one of you, especially those working over the holidays. Your dedication and compassion, often in challenging circumstances, ensure that our patients continue to receive the best care, even during this festive time. The work you do each day is truly remarkable, and I am grateful for your unwavering commitment. Top up your protection – HSE South West Staff Winter Vaccine Campaign Underway


Winter Vaccination Clinics are now underway for all staff working across Cork and Kerry

Approximately 200 professionals including representatives of the Infectious Diseases Department at CUH attended a Sexual Health Conference focusing on digital technology and communication and their impact on sexual wellbeing on Wednesday 2nd October 2024, in Cork City Hall. The conference titled 'Minding your Sexual Wellbeing in a Digital Era' was hosted by the Sexual Health Network, the only network of its kind in Ireland. The network established in 2018, as a forum for knowledge and information sharing, capacity building, awareness raising and referral opportunities

between services in matters of sexual health, healthy relationships and wellbeing in Cork and Kerry. The network which commenced initially with 8 sexual health organisation and charities, has evolved to include a membership of 16 organisations and charities that span across Cork and Kerry. These comprise of HSE services and community and voluntary organisations. The network is funded by the Healthy Ireland Grant Funding via Cork City Council who hosted the conference on the day.






Cork University Hospital Doctorsin-Training Inaugural QI, Audit & Research Mini Symposium



Hello from the EAC Directorate



Professor Conor Deasy, Clinical Director, Emergency and Acute Care, Clinical Led South Trauma & MTA NOCA

As the winter nights draw in we continue to see a steep increase in the numbers of people presenting to the Emergency Department, up 25% on 3 years ago. Our sincere thanks go to CUH Team who work relentlessly and tirelessly each day to manage the busy-ness in ED and across the entire Hospital system for working with us in challenging times.

We have been busy as a Directorate; trying to manage this demand and patient flow while working with the region on solutions to minimise risk and maximise care. We are working to increase the capacity and efficiency of the Acute Floor model with increased Consultant hours 7 days a week and increased hours of operation planned for the Acute Medical Assessment Unit in 2025. The REO, Dr. Andy Philips designated the vacated eye clinic to become medical beds. These will be operationalised as an Acute Medical Decision Unit for admitted medical patients reducing the need for trolleycare in ED.

Frailty Screening at CUH



CUH ED triage nurses went live on the 25th June on iPMS, with a frailty trigger to identify every frail older adult over 75 years.

We are indebted to Norma and her staff, Dr. Jonathan Costelloe Emergency Medicine Consultant, Dr. Liz Moloney, Consultant Geriatrician MUH and everyone on the acute floor work stream of the UEC programme for getting us to this point. Next steps will be to quantify frailty in the over 75s presenting to CUH ED, map their current pathways and use that information to design pathways that enhance quality and appropriateness of care with regard to patient outcomes, as per the UEC.

Urgent Virtual Care Centre



The REO has set up a suite of Integr8 Projects to try and improve capacity across the Region. One of these projects is the Urgent Virtual Care Centre at CUH; modelled on similar concepts in North America, Victoria and Copenhagen. The Urgent Virtual Care (UVC) centre commenced operations on Monday 4th November at CUH. It is based on the main concourse of CUH next to the hospital's Ops Hub. This is a

key project of Andy Philips, REO for Cork Kerry Regional Health Area and we have been planning and negotiating this for the last 3 months. The UVC development committee was chaired by Priscilla Lynch who is the Integrated Health Area (IHA) manager and as such sits second in command to Andy Philips in this RHA, Mike O Connor (Consultant Geriatrician and National Clinical Advisor and Group Lead, Acute Hospitals), Gerry McCarthy (Consultant in EM and was Clinical Lead for National Emergency Medicine program at this time), Cathal O'Donnell (Medical Director, National Ambulance Service), Diarmuid Quinlan (Medical Director, ICGP), Gary Stack (Medical Director, SouthDoc), Mari O Donovan (Manager, Cork Kerry Community Health), Isweri Pillay (Clinical Lead, Geriatric Medicine), Finn Coulter (Consultant in EM), Aideen O'Riordan (Unscheduled Care Manager), Siobhan Scanlon (ADON Emergency and Acute Care), Norma O' Sullivan (ADON for Patient Flow), and Conor Deasy (Clinical Director for Emergency and Acute Care) with project management support from PWC.

The aim of UVC is to support optimal navigation and resource utilisation by GPs and Paramedics so a patient gets the right care, by the right service, be that telemedicine virtual assessment and treatment by the UVC senior clinical decision maker or use of hospital or community pathways, much of the time avoiding ED attendance. The UVC is staffed by a consultant and SpR/Fellow in Emergency Medicine, Consultant in Geriatric Medicine with admin and nursing support from the hospital and community based at UVC with us. Hours of operation are 10am-6pm Monday – Friday.

With the central location of UVC in the main concourse at CUH, lends itself to any service being able to provide an urgent virtual appointment, be it a surgical specialty, neurology, rheumatology etc, enabled by the equipment and the staff in the urgent virtual care centre.



Steps towards an Electronic Health Record

While we wait for National delivery of an ICT system we have been working hard to push the boundaries of what is possible in the current system. We have now reverted nearly all of our ED discharge documentation to T-Pro with an immediate positive impact on patient care. Soundbites from our GP Colleagues have been very welcome in understanding the impact of the change:

- 'Makes a huge difference knowing what happened in ED. Detail in the letters has been good to date and much clearer than the old paper version.'
- 'This is really such an excellent initiative that promotes patient safety at the very dangerous interface of primary and secondary care. Speedy, succinct and legible discharges are essential'.
- 'The electronic discharges to date are clear, comprehensive and timely. As GPs it is so vital that we are made aware of any medication changes or follow up arrangements ASAP'

We said goodbye to our dear colleague Dr Jennifer Carroll who retired last week. Jennifer is an absolute legend and was the founding pioneer of the Acute Medicine Assessment Unit in CUH in 2012. Jennifer has had an extremely accomplished career; both clinically and academically, and has inspired many clinical and non-clinical Staff during her time. The Acute Floor Team 'family' had a great send off and we all miss her already. Enjoy the 'holidays' Jennifer!

Major Trauma Centre



Things have been busy in education and training initiatives supporting the development of CUH as a Major Trauma Centre.

The Department of Anaesthesiology and Intensive Care in Cork University hospital ran the inaugural Trauma Resuscitation Anaesthesiology Course on September 24th, 2024. This specialised course, aimed at anaesthetic teams, provided

an immersive learning experience with high-fidelity simulation to sharpen critical trauma management skills. With support from Medguard, Decent Simulators, and the ASSERT cadaver lab, course attendees participated in skills based sessions which focused on emergency thoracostomies, contaminated airway management, front of neck access, and subclavian line insertion. Participants then tackled complex simulated trauma scenarios, combining the day's work to enhance both technical proficiency and decision-making in real-time.

We were fortunate to have an outstanding faculty team from Cork University Hospital (CUH) and from the UK, whose insights and expertise were invaluable in making this course a success.

The Faculty of Surgery also ran a very successful Emergency and Resuscitative Surgery Skills Course run by UCC/CoMH and the Royal College of Surgeons in Ireland. This 2-day course was held at the ASSERT Centre, College of Medicine and Health, UCC, Cork on October 3rd and 4th 2024. The course was entirely practical, with no lectures. The focus on Day 1 was on learning to work as part of a multidisciplinary team in the initial reception and management of major trauma patients.





Simulated scenarios based on real cases covered initial assessment and management of polytrauma patients and attendees learned a systematic approach to critical decision making and intervention, including learning the differing and interchangeable roles that make up the multidisciplinary trauma team. Day 2 was cadaveric dissection, a full day gaining hands-on experience in our state-of-the-art surgical skills laboratory. The course was geared towards surgical trainees and consultants who wish to learn the common and the less commonly required techniques and exposures

encountered in emergency surgery particularly in severely injured patients. A really fabulous 2 day learning event which we hope to replicate in 2025

Congratulations to the In-patient Trauma Service who presented at the British Society of physical and Rehabilitation Medicine. The Team presented on the improved outcomes for all patients who receive Multidisciplinary rehabilitation care; improving outcomes for the patients and reducing length of stay.

And another 20 candidates from the South Trauma Network completed ATLS training at UCC Brookfield in what is now a biannual course, supported by ATLS instructors from across the country.

A big thank you to all the participants, Faculties, Services and Directorates at CUH and UCC for their support in driving these improvements in trauma care delivery.





Update from the Directorate of Oncology – Dearbhaile Collins



Welcome to the winter edition of the one-team newsletter from the CUH/UCC Cancer Centre. We have had an exceptionally busy few months preparing for our peer review visit in September with representatives from the Organisation of European Cancer Institutes (OECI). I would like to take this opportunity to personally thank all the staff who showcased our service so passionately over the two days. This was the culmination of two years' work, and it was wonderful to witness us coming together, as one team at the

packed opening and closing sessions in the auditorium. We have now received the findings and recommendations and I am delighted to share with you that the auditors found we were compliant with 77% of the 345 standards assessed. This is an excellent result and reflective of the high-quality service we provide every day to patients with cancer in the region. I am hugely proud of what we have achieved in such a short space of time and look forward to leading the cancer centre over the coming years as we deliver our strategy and continually improve conditions for patients and staff in our cancer centre.

I would like to welcome Heba Khalil, our new Quality Lead for the cancer centre along with Dr. Marie Tierney who has joined the Psyche-Oncology team. Congratulations to Martin Higgins who is the new lead for Radiation Oncology, and to Roisin Connolly who recently celebrated five years as the Chair of Cancer Research in UCC. We sadly said goodbye to Ciara Duignan last month, so a very big thank you to her for all her work over the past few years. I wish everyone a happy and healthy Christmas and I look forward to another great year working with you in 2025.

OECI Peer Review

An independent panel of experts, from comprehensive cancer centres across Europe visited our centre in mid-September to evaluate our performance on all aspects of clinical care and research. Over two rigorous days, auditors from Oslo, Bergen, Netherlands, Gothenburg and Karolinska in Sweden assessed the validity of our self-assessment scores on 345 quality standards. In total, they conducted 28 group interviews and 13 tours, to determine if our performance meets the standard required for OECI accreditation and designation as a European Cancer Centre. Based on the opportunities identified in the report, we are now developing actions to inform a five-year Quality Improvement Plan that requires approval from the OECI board before a final decision is expected in early 2025. The QIP will be closely aligned to our new strategy and implementation plan.

Liam Mc Trial nominated for Multidisciplinary Team of the Year Award



The Liam Mc Trial team, led by Principal Investigators Professor Jack Gleeson, Consultant Medical Oncologist at Cork University Hospital (CUH) and Dr Brendan Noonan, University College Cork (UCC), was recently shortlisted as a finalist in the Multidisciplinary Team of the Year category at the Hospital Professional Honours Awards 2024. The awards event took place at the Dublin Royal Convention Centre on September 14th. Funded by the Irish Cancer Society as part of their Men's Health

Initiative, the Liam Mc Trial is a 12-week group-based interventional programme designed for men with advanced genitourinary cancers. This programme is available to patients at CUH and other hospitals in the region and encompasses intensive multidisciplinary input from a team of healthcare professionals based in CUH. Participants benefit from personalised tools and coping mechanisms for life with cancer. The programme incorporates expertise from physiotherapists, dietitians,

specialist nurses, medical social workers, and psychooncology professionals, with programme oversight by medical oncologists, all taking place at the Mardyke Arena, UCC. While the team did not receive the overall award on the night, the intervention and input from the team was recognised as being invaluable to improving the quality of life for people diagnosed with cancer.









AYA Study day 11.11.2024

On November 11, 2024 a highly engaging and insightful Adolescent and Young Adult (AYA) Study Day took place at Bru Columbanus. This well-attended event offered healthcare professionals from various disciplines an invaluable opportunity to delve into the unique principles of care essential for supporting AYAs with cancer. The day featured diverse speakers, each bringing expertise from their field and enriching the understanding of AYA-specific challenges and best practices. A highlight of the day was a heartfelt presentation from a young patient of Dr. Molloy, who attended with her mother. With remarkable maturity and eloquence, she shared her personal journey navigating cancer treatment at Cork University Hospital (CUH), offering attendees a deeply moving perspective on the AYA cancer experience. Her story underscored the resilience and strength of young patients, leaving an impact on all present.

It is now two years since the establishment of the interventional radiology clinic at CUH. As interventional radiology continues along the path of independent speciality recognition, CUH was one of the first sites nationally to formalise an in-person interventional radiology clinic. Established by Dr. Heather Moriarty in 2022, the clinic is now staffed by four interventional radiology consultants and has allowed for rapid expansion in the spectrum of elective/semi-urgent care and procedures delivered including:

- The transfer of the national HHT pulmonary AVM embolization programme to CUH.

- Uterine fibroid embolization.

The clinic has allowed direct referrals to the IR department where the consultants now have the capacity to see their patients before their procedure and provide the appropriate clinical follow-up. In the most recent anonymised survey of patients attending the clinic, 100% of patients reported that the clinic had addressed the reason they were referred, and all patients rated their care in the clinic as excellent (85.7%) or excellent (14.3%).

Update from the Paediatric Directorate

Professor Colin Hawkes was appointed to the role of Clinical Director for the Paediatrics Directorate in October 2024. Colin returned to Cork in 2020 to take up his current position as Consultant Paediatric Endocrinologist in CUH. Prior to this, he completed Paediatric Endocrinology Fellowship at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia, and was subsequently appointed as Clinical Director of their Diabetes Centre. While in Philadelphia, he led the development of the Endocrine Late Effects of Cancer Programme, and the Community Health Workers in Type 1 Diabetes Initiative. He is a US-board certified Paediatric Endocrinologist and has Masters Degrees in Education (UCC), as well as in Leadership in Healthcare (RCSI).

His PhD thesis (UCC) focused on disorders of childhood growth and his research includes over 100 publications and book chapters spanning the spectrum of paediatric endocrinology, including disorders of growth and puberty, calcium metabolism, thyroid dysfunction, diabetes and hypoglycaemia.

He regularly speaks internationally on these topics, and his current research focus is on improving outcomes in children with type 1 diabetes. He also holds appointments as Associate Professor of Paediatrics at University College Cork, Adjunct Associate Professor at the University of Pennsylvania, and Principle Investigator at the INFANT Research Centre.

Cork University Hospital-University College Cork (CUH-UCC) Paediatric Allergy Research Group at the Irish Centre for Maternal and Child Health (INFANT) has been recognised as a World Allergy Organisation (WAO) Center of Excellence, the first of its kind in Ireland.

The prestigious accreditation recognises CUH-UCC's position as a global leader in allergy and immunology research, education, and clinical care.

The WAO Centers of Excellence programme aims to intensify and accelerate multidisciplinary scientific and clinical innovation, education, and advocacy worldwide. CUH-UCC joins leading international centres which advance excellence in education, research, and training in allergy, asthma, and clinical immunology.

In Ireland, 10% of children and young adults have more than one allergic or atopic disorder such as food allergy, eczema, asthma and allergic rhinitis. Allergies in childhood can have a major impact on the overall quality of life of a child. In severe cases, children may experience anaphylaxis, a severe and potentially life-threatening reaction. Early identification and management of allergies are crucial in supporting the lifelong health and well-being of children.



Transforming the lives of patients and their families

Operating from Cork University Hospital and University College Cork, the CUH-UCC Paediatric Allergy Research Group aims to transform the lives of patients in Ireland and worldwide. The group's main focus is on the translational paediatric allergy field, in particular food allergies, analysing how bacteria can affect allergies within the gut, skin and lungs, and quality of life. They are dedicated to discovering new therapies to diagnose food allergies and to prevent allergies from happening in the first place.

The co-directors of the Paediatric Allergy Research Group are Dr Juan Trujillo, Consultant Paediatric Allergist, and Program Director of the Postgraduate Program in Allergy and Clinical Immunology at UCC, and Dr Audrey Dunn-Galvin, Senior Lecturer, Associate Professor Applied Psychology at UCC.

Advancing multidisciplinary research and innovation

Cork University Hospital CEO, David Donegan said: "This accreditation highlights our dedication to providing the highest level of care to paediatric allergy patients. It reinforces our commitment to patient education, advocacy, and innovative therapies."

The majority of clinical research is undertaken is in CUH, while research spans across UCC including the Department of Paediatrics and Child Health, School of Applied Psychology, School of Food and Nutritional Sciences, and School of Nursing and Midwifery. Active partners and collaborators in the allergy field include the Irish Centre for Maternal and Child Health (INFANT centre), HRB Clinical Research Facility (CRF-UCC), and APC Microbiome Ireland.

The CUH-UCC Paediatric Allergy Research Group also delivers education programmes which attract students from across the globe and pivotal to the WAO accreditation is the success of the online postgraduate programme in Allergy and Clinical Immunology.

This significant piece of work carried out by an extraordinary group of staff from MUH and CUH. The amalgamation incorporated moving everything that made St Annes Function in MUH across the city to CUH. The many work streams included Human resources, ICT, Moving day, communication and Governance. We had a lot of early morning meetings to allow staff go back to do their day jobs afterwards. The work was hard and difficult at times and required changing direction once or twice but in June the entire wards from MUH moved to CUH to bespoke Haematology oncology area and for the general paediatrics an increase to 12 beds for the service. We are all ever grateful that the actual day of the move went off without a hitch. Fast forward a few months and we are told we have been short listed for 2024 National Project Awards- Public Sector, run by Ireland Chapter of Project Management Institute and PWC. As you can see from the photos we won the award. This is a huge recognition to the work that the project group did together and a great endorsement from outside agencies for the work we had done. The award is shared with more than the 38 on the project team it is shared with every member of staff that works in the department and to the children and families that access our services.

Newly Developed Multi-Factorial Falls Risk Assessment Tool which has been incorporated into nursing documentation



MGH launched the electronic point of entry for incidents and dangerous occurrences on Friday 25th October.

All reported incidents (clinical & non-clinical) can now be entered directly onto the NIMS, eliminating the need for paper reporting. It is expected that this will speed up the time from incident occurrence to uploading onto NIMS, resulting in more accurate and timely reports for the hospital.

The benefits of electronic point of entry include:

- Real time data on incident occurrences/ near-misses
- User-friendly, intuitive, reliable system
- nitiates prompt for review & risk mitigation processes
- Supports the monitoring of KPIs in patient safety
- Eliminates common issue of illegibility in incident reporting
- No licence fees






New Running Club at the Hospital: Join Us for Fitness and Fun!

Adult Patient Safety Huddles in Cork University Hospital

As of 2024 the Deteriorating Patient Service are delighted to highlight Cork University Hospital is the first Hospital in Ireland to implement a standardised Patient Safety Huddle, specific to acuity, across all our 20 Adult In-patient wards. Our target was to proactively identify avoidable harm with the aim to reduce or eliminate adverse events through situational awareness. We followed the recommendation from the deteriorating patient improvement programme of Ireland (DPIP) and a hospital directive. We used a standardised huddle script and quality improvement tool as a marker to improve compliance. Additional to this, six wards are affiliated with Royal College Surgeons of Ireland incorporating the S.A.F.E. Update from CUH research Committee Chair



Prof Fai Ng, Director of CRF-UCC

Dear Colleagues,

Thank you for the opportunity to update you regarding developments in enabling Clinical Research in CUH. I am the current Chair of the CUH Research Committee. I am a Consultant Nephrologist in CUH since 2005. My areas of special clinical interest are Renal Transplantation and Small Vessel Vasculitis and my research interests are predominantly in interventional clinical trials in glomerular disease and clinical outcomes in small vessel vasculitis. I took on the role of Chair because I strongly believe that excellence in clinical research is a prerequisite for excellence in clinical service delivery. We must always seek to be at the forefront of improvements in patient care through participation in clinical research activities. I believe that CUH is very well positioned to become a national leader in clinical research activity given the co-location of all specialties on

one campus, our strong collaboration with the UCC College of Medicine and Health (CoMH) and the large and diverse patient population that we serve.

My wish is to see CUH build on its existing strong and diverse portfolio of research activities in areas including Cancer, Medical Imaging, Cystic Fibrosis, Renal Medicine, Gastroenterology, Dermatology, Vascular Neurology & Stroke, Gerontology, and Respiratory Disease as well as across surgical specialities such as Urology, Orthopaedics and General Surgery to name but a few. We are very fortunate to have committed, dedicated and internationally recognised investigators along with CUH based dedicated research groups, including CRF-UCC, Cancer Trials Cork, INFANT and APC. I would like to take this opportunity to warmly welcome Professor Fai Ng as Director of the CRF-UCC. Professor Ng is a Consultant Rheumatologist with globally recognized expertise and is a key opinion leader in Sjögren's syndrome and fatigue research. He has led numerous early-phase clinical trials and experimental medicine studies. Prof. Ng was previously the Director of the NIHR Clinical Research Facility in Newcastle. We look forward to working closely with him and his team.

There is increasing awareness and emphasis as to the vital importance of clinical health research and that it needs to be embedded in the routine everyday activity of delivering healthcare. Clinical research needs to be seen as a fundamental component of a well-functioning healthcare system. Patients benefit from better outcomes and when well resourced, helps to retain and improve job satisfaction for our clinical staff.

Nationally, the importance of clinical research can be seen with the establishment of the HSE national Research and Development Office, under the guidance of Dr. Ana Terres.

Regionally this commitment can be seen by the appointment of Ms Rafaela Carapêto as SSWHG Research Manager in 2022. Rafaela is passionate about research and is committed in supporting the region thereby ensuring patients have access to the benefits that clinical research has to offer. Rafaela knows first-hand the importance of this, having previously worked in the Cancer Trials Cork as a Research Radiation Therapist. She is supporting the establishment of The Academic Health Science Research and Development Office (AHS R&D). A collaboration between UCC and the South West Region for supporting researchers in the development, implementation and delivery of world-class experimental, translational and clinical research.

Establishing the AHS R&D Office will serve as a cornerstone in developing an Academic Health Science System within our Health Region. The collaboration aligns research, education, and clinical care across the university and health service which will facilitate and foster innovation, and excellence.

Key developments in CUH:

CUH Research Committee: The CUH Research Committee has been re-established since Q4 2023. It meets bi-monthly to oversee all Clinical Research activity within the CUHG. It is tasked with overseeing the administrative and governance requirements

for Clinical Research in an ever more complex regulatory framework. The Committee seeks to promote and support high quality healthcare research aligned within the CUHG mission, vision and values. I am proud that the Committee has a broad representation from UCC CoMH, the Clinical Research Facility (CRF-UCC) and across medical, nursing, allied health and administrative groups within the institution. I am delighted that Dr Fiona Byrne, (PhD, RD, CUH Dietitian Manager in Charge III) has agreed to be the Vice Chair of the Committee and brings with her a wealth of expertise in the field.

CUH Research Office: This is currently being formally established and I look forward to updating you more on this in the future. The establishment, co-ordination and management of this will be under the remit of Dr Claire Brady who was successful in being appointed as CUH Research Manager. Dr Brady is a 2010 medical graduate of University College Cork and previously worked as an Oncology Registrar with Cancer Trials Cork in CUH. She is patient focused and wants to ensure that patients can access trials in a timely manner through streamlining the research approval process and working to eliminate any administrative hurdles that may act as a barrier to opening trials.

CUH commitment to research is clear with Research, Innovation & Education being named as one of the five key strategic priorities in the recently published Cork University Hospital Four Year Strategic Plan – Fit for Fifty.

We are building strong foundations to ensure that Clinical Research is a core and integral part of our service delivery to ensure patients receive the



highest standard of care. I look forward to updating you in the New Year of our ongoing progress.



Caroline Joyce, Principal Clinical Biochemist in CUH was the first employee in the HSE South/Southwest Group to secure an Employment-based PhD scholarship from the Irish Research Council (IRC) for her PhD entitled "The evaluation of biomarkers for the diagnosis, management and follow up of women with Gestational Trophoblastic Disease (GTD)".

GTD is a rare disorder affecting 1 in 600 pregnancies. Molar pregnancy (hydatidiform mole) is the commonest form of GTD, and women can develop a malignancy known as gestational trophoblastic neoplasia (GTN) following a molar pregnancy. In 2017, the National GTD Registry was established in Cork University Maternity Hospital (http://gtd-cumh.irelandsouthwid.ie/) by the HSE and the NCCP with Dr John Coulter (Consultant Gynaecological Oncologist) as the National Clinical Lead.

Caroline's PhD evaluated biomarkers for the earlier detection of GTD and GTN. Her research investigated novel methods to measure the biomarker hCG in an effort to provide timely and equitable access to diagnostics for all women with this rare disease. Her PhD was supervised by Prof. Keelin O'Donoghue (Pregnancy Loss Research Centre (PLRG) INFANT Centre, UCC) and Prof. Tommie McCarthy (School of Biochemistry and Cell Biology, UCC). Dr John Coulter (Clinical Lead for GTD) was Caroline's employment-based mentor and PhD advisor.

She submitted her thesis by publication to UCC in March 2024 and was examined in her viva voce, by Dr Christianne Lok, Consultant Gynaecological Oncologist (Netherlands Cancer Institute) and Dr Collette Hand, Lecturer Department of Pathology (UCC). She successfully defended her thesis on 19th April 2024 and graduated with a PhD from the College of Medicine and Health, UCC on October 25th 2024. On the same day her daughter Rachel Moriarty graduated in the inaugural class of the iED Hub's MSc in Industrial Pharmaceutical Sciences Operations and Management (IPSOM), making this a unique day for the family and UCC.

Her PhD resulted in 8 first-author publications in high-impact journals, all available as open access. In 2023, she was commissioned by RTÉ to write an article on GTD which featured on their website in November (https://www.rte.ie/brainstorm/2023/1102/1414271-molar-pregnancy-explainer-cancer-risk/).

During her PhD, Caroline completed her fellowship examinations with the Royal College of Pathologists, London. This examination is an assessment of a candidate's training programme, indicating fitness to practice, and ability to enter independent practice as a consultant in pathology. Caroline was awarded full fellowship status (FRC Path) in September 2023.

Caroline works closely with the Perinatal Pathology team in CUH, led by Dr Brendan Fitzgerald and she has collaborated internationally with Professor Michael

Seckl, Consultant Oncologist at the Charing Cross GTD centre. She has co-authored papers with members of the European Organisation for the Treatment of Trophoblastic Disease (EOTTD). These include Practical Guidelines of the EOTTD for Pathological and Genetic Diagnosis of Hydatidiform Mole (2023) and When to Consult a Geneticist Specialising in Gestational Trophoblastic Disease (2023). She is also co-author of the HSE National Clinical Guideline for the Diagnosis, Staging and Treatment of Patients with GTD (2022) and a member of the Expert Advisory Group for the NWIHP National Maternity and Gynaecology Clinical Guideline Programme.

She has presented her work at CUMH grand rounds and numerous research symposiums. She has delivered oral presentations at multidisciplinary conferences both nationally (All Ireland Rare Disease Interdisciplinary Research Network, RAiN) and internationally (International Society for the Study of Trophoblastic Disease, ISSTD XXI World Congress on GTD in Sydney, Australia 2022), (European Organisation for the Treatment of Trophoblastic Disease, EOTTD Cork 2022, Warsaw 2023 and Stockholm 2024). She remains an active member of PLRG and further information on Caroline's research work is available on their website








Reflective Practice Supports Deeper Understanding of Self and Others



Reflective practice has enormous potential not just to improve the quality of work in healthcare settings but also the capacity to improve the emotional wellbeing of staff through a carefully facilitated process of group reflection.

Driven by that potential, a team of CUH and CUMH psychologists took on an important piece of work bringing reflective practice to staff groups within the campus. UCC psychology student Sarah Nester went on to study the impact of that work. Under the supervision Dr Marcia Ward and Dr. Eadaoin Whelan, School of Applied Psychology, UCC, Sarah Nester looked at the impact a reflective practice group had on the reflective practice skills among healthcare workers in CUH/CUMH.

The study lead to some interesting findings and suggestions for further research. The themes identified from the data illustrated that reflective practice groups can lead to a deeper understanding of self and work colleagues and can provide individuals with the skills to better manage work challenges. The author posited additional research could provide further evidence that reflective practice groups are an evidence-based practice in supportingstaff wellbeing and ensuring a high quality of care for patients in healthcare settings.

Hand hygiene

CUH is proud to report significant improvement in our hand hygiene compliance with the 5 moments of hand hygiene for the month of November. An overall result of 92% compliance (from 87.6% on last national

audit) was reported both in National hand hygiene and local hand hygiene audits. HSE target is 90% compliance. Well done and thank you to all the local auditors and IPC staff driving improvement in this area. Managers are supported by trained hand hygiene auditors and Infection Prevention Control Nurses to embed good hand hygiene in every day clinical practice in their areas and their dedication and leadership in this area is key to ensuring standards area maintained.

Hand hygiene education continues to be available for all staff on a monthly basis and all staff area required to have HSE land hand hygiene training up to date. CUH continues to ensure the most effective hand hygiene is being delivered by supporting the bare below the elbows campaign. Watches and jewellery pose a risk to effeteness of hand hygiene as harmful organisms can adhere to these surfaces and are not easily removed. Hand hygiene is the single most important practice in the reduction of the transmission of infection in the healthcare setting.

C.diff awareness in CUH (Clostridium difficile)

C. difficile infection continues to pose a risk to patients on our facilities. National CDI (C. difficile infection) rate in hospitalised patients Q2 2024 is reported to be 4.2 cases per 10,000 bed days used (BDU), which is higher to that reported for Q2 2023 [379 cases; rate 3.5]. The national KIP aims for 2 per 10,000 BDU. CUH Infection Prevention Control Team (IPCT) and Antimicrobial Stewardship Team (AMS) joint forces to create a really impactful C. diff awareness day July 2024. Highlighting to all staff on how debilitating a C.diff infection can be for our patients and emphasising all the key measures each staff member to take to reduce risks of C.diff.

Regardless of staff members role they play a part in reducing the risk of C. diff transmission. Emphasising the correct cleaning using hypochlorite solution, appropriate hand hygiene, early identification of symptoms to promptly initiate contact precautions and isolation. Careful use of antimicrobials was emphasised using pharmacy app (new app. is 'Eolas medical'). These infections can be extremely debilitating and have long lasting impact on patients' lives with some reporting symptoms prevented them from participating in usual daily activities. The IPCT and AMS continue to drive this messaging locally to reduce the rates of these infections and reduce negative impact for our patients.




CUH making a splash about CPE (Carbapenemase Producing Enterobacterales

We know CPE is a bacteria that are resistant to last resort antibiotics available for treating serious infections. And CPE can cause up to 50% mortality rate if infection occurs. Though worryingly we are seeing an increase in CPE cases nationally and locally. It has been well documented CPE can be found in wet environments such as sink and shower drains. This campaign aimed at increasing awareness of the risks associated with inappropriate use of our hand hygiene sinks.

Particularly in relation to how harmful inappropriate disposal of waste liquids can be. This one measure can do to try mitigate the risks of resistant organisms contaminating the clinical environment. To enhance the understanding of this campaign CPE educations sessions have been facilitated at a local and hospital wide level. We continue to make a splash about CPE and drive quality initiates around this for improved patient safety. locally to reduce the rates of these infections and reduce negative impact for our patients.
